throwable flotation devices include ring buoys and horseshoe shaped buoys seen on some large sailboats.

Smalley said another problem is some boaters think all they need are seat cushions, not life vests. Years ago, throwable seat cushions fulfilled the requirement for flotation devices on smaller boats. That changed in 1996.

Minnesota law requires all boats, regardless of length (including canoes, kayaks and duck boats) to have readily accessible Coast Guard approved Type I, II, III or V wearable life jacket for each person on board. Type IV throwable devices, such as boater's cushions, are no longer acceptable.

Some good news: DNR conservation officers are seeing almost 100 percent compliance for the requirement that kids under age 10 wear a life vest, according to Smalley.

## 2008 mission trip gearing up from Aitkin to Ukraine



By Connie Pettersen From July 30 to Aug.15, a local team of seven will be on a mission trip to Shulyaki, Ukraine. Since 1994, a "sister church" relationship has been established between Glory Baptist Church and the House of Prayer, a church in the village Shulyaki.

Through mission trips and

followup communications via e-mail and ministry partnerships, a widening bond has grown between Ukraine and Minnesota. It's a bond unheard of during decades of cold war between the Soviet Union and America.

Ukraine separated from the Soviet Union in 1992. An idea germinated through the Minne-

sota Baptist Conference (MBC) to partnership MBC churches with Baptist churches in the former Soviet Union. Then God led them to start in Ukraine by opening a door—a tremendous revival was beginning there, plus it was accessible, when many other Russian republics were not.

#### Mission trip to Ukraine | Continued from Page 1



House of Prayer in Shulyaki, which is Glory Baptist's "sister congregation."

Coupled with a recent passion for democracy in Ukraine, the MBC followed scriptural mandates to go and preach the Gospel of Christ, encouraging churches in their conference to organize mission trips.

Glory Baptist of the Aitkin area took the challenge. They have sent a team to Ukraine 11 times. Their 2008 group is Randy, Shannon and Amy Stauter, Roy and Ruth Egstad from Glory Baptist, Debby Hoppe from the Glen Community Church and Judy Peysar from the Glory area.

Ruth Egstad, one of this summer's team, said she and her husband Roy have made four previous trips. "It's something we really like to do together," she said. But we face increased expenses this time due to worldwide gas prices. Plus we always have housing costs for our team members plus translators."

They usually take supplies along or purchase materials over there for special craft projects. "This year we are decorating tote bags," Egstad said. "We give gifts and draw names for prizes, and the local people really get into that."

They work with locals to facilitate a children's adventure camp, similar to American Bible schools. These camps are in three separate locations and include singing, skits, crafts, snacks, games and Bible lessons for about 350 children from two to three villages.

Noah's Ark and how God keeps His promises is this year's theme and T-shirts in rainbow colors will be given to participants. In the evenings, men's and women's groups are

held, plus the team participates in worship services of several surrounding churches.

Ukrainian host families house team members and an interpreter. About a third of the interpreters (college age youth from urban areas), are not believers, so camps also offer an opportunity for them to hear the Gospel.

The Egstads got involved with mission trips because they just knew it was what God wanted them to do. "The thing I'm always struck by is how many people not associated with Glory church end up going or helping," said Egstad. "We are able to tell them over there that each trip is really a community effort."

Inflation has hit Ukraine hard, especially in rural areas. Some people have cars, but gasoline is expensive or not available. Many depend on horses and wagons. "When some former Soviet countries switched over to the Euro, their economies went wacko," Egstad added. While government funds their schools, smaller, rural areas get a lot less. Consequently, mission teams have brought over school supplies, protractors, calculators, etc., as kids in those areas lack science-oriented materials.

When they first started in Shulyaki, many children were rather lawless. "We had to hold on to our scissors, pencils, and in particular, markers. They'd be gone and in back pockets," said Egstad. As years went by, mission teams and locals have observed a big difference in the children's behavior.

One man (Ivan) hosts mem-

For years, Ukrainian Christian leaders have pointed out the thousands of small village collectives that pepper the countryside. Many of these rural villages had no Christian church (Evangelical or Orthodox) to counter confusing echoes of 70 years of atheistic communism. New "sister" churches plus Ukrainian young people, along with financial help from American churches, have been running Adventure Camps as preparation for planting the Christian church in these "shadowed villages." Thus far, they have impacted 40-50 villages in eight regions of Ukraine with many new faces of ministry. Four to five hundred people travel annually to Ukraine and the opportunities and blessings are increasing.

bers of the mission team. Through an interpreter, Ivan told the Egstads he can't believe he has an American at his table. The Egstads have told Ivan they can't believe that they are actually sitting there. "If he thinks we were once the enemy, we thought he was, too," she said.

Egstad described Ivan as one of the biggest communists in the area, (he still prefers that kind of economy) and Ivan did not want his grandson to attend day camps. "But our camp was the only thing that happened all summer long for these kids," said Egstad. "We were getting kids that normally we wouldn't have had, just because it was something for them to do."

Against Ivan's wishes, his daughter began sending his grandson to camp. Today Ivan and his wife Maria not only host

team members, he also admits seeing a difference in the behaviors of some individuals.

"They don't call it coming to Christ," Egstad explained. "The Ukrainians call it 'repentance'. And it's a good way of looking at it, as it's a change from what you were, to who you are going to be."

The 2008 Ukraine team will be commissioned at Glory Baptist Church (28053 360th Ave., Aitkin, MN 56431) on Sun., July 27 at 10:30 a.m. The church is 12 miles SE of Aitkin off County Road 12 (Deer Street) or 4 miles west of Glen. Prayers and financial support are also needed. Each team member needs \$3,000 to cover transportation, housing, crafts, etc. For further information on how to help the Ukraine mission team, call 218-927-3678.



Following the California Supreme Court's decision to legislate from the bench, Sen. Roger Wicker, R-Miss., has reintroduced a constitutional amendment in the Senate to protect marriage from redefinition by state and federal judges.

The Senate amendment states: "Marriage in the United States shall consist only

of the union of a man and a woman." It mirrors House legislation sponsored by Rep. Paul Broun, R-Ga.

"Invariably, couples from that state will now move to states like Mississippi, or the other states that have prohibitions on same-sex 'marriage,' "Wicker said, "and they will ask that those 'marriages' be recognized."

Tom McClusky, vice president for government affairs at the Family Research Council, said amending the Constitution would be best for kids, who are the real victims of same-sex "marriages."

"Children are best served by having both a mother and a father," he said. "To deprive a child of (that) is something that no government should be trying to push."

The amendment needs a two-thirds majority in the House and Senate. It then would go to the states for approval.





### www.NewsHopper.net Verbal History of the Riverboat Era - Part 2

BY PHILIP NEESE Diana Rian's mother, Elizabeth Boyer was the daughter of Charles Viebahn, Captain of the Riverboats and she, Elizabeth, compiled these records.

In 1902 the second Riverboat, Irene was ready to go. This boat was owned by Viebahn and Punteney. They had the business pretty much to themselves and really did very well. They carried 1,200 passengers and 225 tons of freight, valued at \$101,750 from 1906 through 1908. The second Irene carried the bulk of passengers and freight. It carried 5500 passengers, 6,000 ton of freight per year for a few years. Business was so good they decided to build

another boat in 1907. This boat was called the Oriole and was launched in 1908. It was 105 feet long. The Irene was only 70 feet.

In May of 1908 the Irene sank and was raised and run for another year, sank a second time and then was dismantled.

In 1909 and 1910 the Oriole operated alone. Business was good for a few more years and then declined fast. In about 1915, the boat was sold to the government and used as a dredge boat. The last boat built by Viebahn and Punteney was the Lee, which was smaller than the Oriole. During the Lee's first year it carried 1,050

passengers and 1500 tons of freight. After 1912 business began to decline rapidly and in 1915 Viebahn sold the Lee to W. V. Punteney. Punteney ran it alone for part of two seasons and then it sank at Gyde's Mill. Bill Punteney semi-retired on the bank of the Mississippi and did a little farming. Mr. Viebahn got married at age 43 and had nine children to raise and couldn't retire, so he went into

farming, also on the river. The Oriole was sold to a man who made a tourist attraction out of it on Sandy Lake. His name was George Mattoon. He called it the Ark and it burned in 1941.

There were many barges and

wanigans on the river all the years up until 1950. There were about 25 landings along the river. The distance from Aitkin to Grand Rapids was 130 miles by river, 53 miles by road and 40 miles by air.

People used to tell me things about the riverboat. Lots of farmers rode the boat and got off at landings and carried their groceries and supplies through the woods to their new homes on narrow trails either on foot or on horseback.

Note: In 1908, Diana's grandmother, Elizabeth Agnes Toms wrote a letter to her mother, Anna Burden, saying the Oriole cost \$6,000 to build and it had electric lights.

Elizabeth was born in Ontario, Canada and Anna was born in Dorset, England.

Wanigan was mentioned as a type of watercraft. Wanigan is an Ojibwa word meaning shelter. In the early days, on the Mississippi there was a need for a craft that could move supplies and people from the steamboat landings to the logging camps that were located on smaller rivers (tributaries). These crafts were probably a combination of raft and a crude shelter. The first houseboats. if you will. These crafts were towed to the smaller rivers and then poled by manpower up to the camps and farmers. Wanigans were also used as

cook shacks, bunkhouses or headquarters.

A bridge was built over the Mississippi at Palisade and David Rian tells us about this bridge. "My grandfather Alfred Rian helped build this bridge. It was a very high bridge built so the riverboats could travel underneath. The approaches to this bridge were so steep that the only way a person could get a Model 'A' Ford over this bridge was to put the car in reverse and back up over the bridge (The reverse gear in a Model 'A' was geared lower than first gear). Backing over that bridge took a great deal of skill and must have been quite a thrill for the passengers."





By Kathy C. Bryan The Ironton City Council met July 2 at 6 p.m. at the Ironton City Hall. Present, Mayor David Hicks, Council Members Bill Thoms, Dean French, Bill Wynn and Laura Ukura-Lier. Also present City Clerk-Treasurer, Rose Caddy.

LuAnn Maschler, Building Inspector was called to appear before the Council concerning an issue a resident brought to the Council at the last meeting. Maschler visited the properties in question last week and decided that the garage overhang in question was too close to the neighbor's property and deemed the culprit for causing water damage to the adjacent garage. Since the overhang was constructed in the last few years, it is in violation of building codes. The overhang has since been removed by the property owner. Maschler stated the fence in question is situated about one foot from the property line and adhered to the building codes when it was installed years ago. The neighbor complained that due to the close proximity to her structure, it is difficult to perform necessary fence maintenance. Maschler suggested the property owners work out a satisfactory resolution to this problem since she can not cite a violation of the building code in this regard.

Council Member Ukura-Lier asked Maschler to provide a structural assessment to the Council regarding City Hall. Maschler stated a new elevator and the bathrooms must be handicapped accessible. On this same issue, a letter from Structural Design Associates was reviewed. Dwayne Moench, the licensed engineer that performed a structural analysis on City Hall stated the overall structure is in good condition, and the addition of an elevator should pose no problem for load transfer.

State Representative John Ward appeared before the Council with an update on the recent Legislative Session he attended. Ward can be reached at: rep.john.ward@ house.mn or Ironton residents with concerns may write to him at 533 State Office Building, St. Paul, MN 55155.

A resolution was adopted to renew Town Tavern's liquor license that expires on Aug. 31.

Jeff Webb from SEH presented an update on the removal of the old water tower. An Environmental Assessment Worksheet must be completed on all historical landmarks demolished or disassembled. The assessment calculates hazardous waste and toxic chemicals

such as lead paint. In addition, Webb stated the proposed demolition will be posted publicly for thirty days allowing residents to comment or state objections. Completion of the project is tentatively scheduled for December of 2009.

Webb distributed a letter from SEH commenting on the proposed rezoning of Jeff Olson's property on June Lake. At the time Ironton's Comprehensive Plan was written, future rezoning was contemplated, however spot zoning on a particular piece of property isn't allowed. Webb suggested that if the Council wishes to proceed in this regard, the entire strip around the lake should be rezoned. Black Hoof Lake could also be rezoned at that time. Webb also suggested the Council consider updating the nine-year old Comprehensive Plan in the near future. Webb, Olson and Langel, the City Attorney, will continue to work together to find a solution to Olson's request to build on the property.

Kim Coughlin, Police Chief distributed copies of a courtesy card the Police Department will be distributing to parked vehicles soon. Coughlin stated the cards are not tickets, but a reminder that the vehicle is unlocked, in a poorly lit area or valuables in the car are visible. Coughlin also informed the Council police calls have increased by 100 from this time last year. Coughlin also reminded the Council the park is closed and gated each night by 10 p.m. and opens again in the morning by 5 a.m. The Crosby-Ironton Police Department was fully-staffed over the Fourth of July to accommodate visitor traffic and planned events.

Brian Blom from the Fire Department informed the Council he met with Tom Koop from Larson Allen recently concerning the Fire Fighter Relief Fund. Projecting three years out, there are enough funds to merit an increase from \$500 to \$624 for every year a fireman has served until retirement. A resolution to adopt the increase will be presented to the Council in the Fall when departmental budgets are done. Blom also informed the Council the 100 year anniversary of Ironton's Fire Department is 2012.

Elissa Rogers from Brainerd Lakes Area Development Corporation (BLADC) appeared, stating BLADC and the Cuyuna Range Economic Development partnered to apply for SCDP funds. Rogers coordinated the application for the cities of Ironton, Crosby, Deerwood and Emily. The primary objective of the program is to develop viable communities by providing decent affordable housing and a suitable living environment by expanding economic opportunities for persons of low and moderate income. All property/building owners with qualifying improvements for properties located within the downtown business zoned districts in all four cities are eligible. Rogers stated \$770,000 in funds will be allocated soon and must be used within a certain time period. To date, 35 applicants from the four cities have applied for funds. Rogers is in the process of formulating a Board to distribute the funds and would be happy to have one of the Council Members from

Ironton sit on the Board.

July 12, 2008

Mayor Hicks suggested that when the water tower is taken down and hauled away, other scrap metal in and around Ironton also be collected, specifically the 18-20 light poles on the ground near the pump house.

A motion was carried to renew the \$95 membership dues for the Cuyuna Range Chamber of Commerce.

A lengthy discussion was held concerning the hours the City Clerks work at City Hall. A motion was carried to specify the official hours as 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. When the Assistant City Clerk covers these hours, the Clerk-Treasurer may opt to work 7-3, otherwise her official hours are 8-4. Future overtime and comp time for the Clerks will not be allowed unless pre-approved by the Mayor and/or the Council.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned. The Ironton City Council meets the first and third Wednesdays of the month at 6 p.m., City Hall. The meetings are open to the public and attendance is encouraged.



Anyone who knows the wren also knows it is neither modest nor shy, but rather it is very loud and chatty.

The House Wren is the plainest and the most common of the North American wrens. Both the male and female are outwardly similar in color and

There is a story in European size. It is approximately five inches long. It is a gray-brown color above and a pale gray color below. They have narrow black barring on the wings and tail, with light streaks over each eye. They have a fairly long sharp bill. The scientific name for the House Wren (troglodytes aedon) was given to the bird in 1807 by Louis Jean Pierre Viellot presumably because he thought its call sounded a lot like the European Nightingale and because it preferred to nest in holes or crevices around homes. It is the only wren that seems to enjoy nesting around human buildings.

> The House Wren is found throughout Minnesota, nesting in all eighty-seven counties. The male returns to northern Minnesota in late April or early May, a week or two ahead of the female. His territory is usually along the edges

of woods, in residential areas, in yards, in parks or in gardens. He announces that this is his territory by singing in a clear, loud and bubbly voice all around his area. He immediately starts filling up all possible nesting cavities in his area with small sticks. When I was young, I thought that he just didn't like to have any neighbors around him. But the truth is that he has to make several houses for the female to pick from when she returns. When the female returns, he shows her all the houses he has built for her to pick from and hopefully she will like one of them enough to nest in it. When she chooses an acceptable nesting sight, she lines it with softer grasses and feathers so it is just right for her five to nine eggs which are white with brown speckles. Incubation takes from 14 to 15 days. The young are fed almost exclusively on insects (grasshoppers, beetles, moths, ants, bees, flies, etc.) They leave the nest in 15 to 18 days. Most often, they will have two broods. While the male looks after the recently fledged young, the female will be sitting on her second clutch of eggs. The House Wren can live up to five or six years.


As an interesting sidelight, the female members of the British navy are called Wrens, not because of the bird, but instead from WRNS (Women's Royal Navy Service).

It is a good idea to clean out your birdhouses each fall. Birds like to start over the following spring and the House Wren is definitely one who likes to build new each year. It is a good way to insure that the chatty little jenny wren will continue to come back to your yard for years to come.

## Question for the DNR

Q: Finding a place to ride an ATV or other OHV machine takes a little research. Minnesota offers a variety of trails. Are there different "levels" of riding opportunities? And how can riders find the trail that fits their needs?

A: Minnesota is using the standard ski hill symbols to identify level of difficulty. The symbols are: green circle - easy, blue square - moderate, and black diamond - technical or advanced. Most public OHV trails are green with some blue levels available. The Red Dot and Spider Lake systems are two sites that have some blue level trails. At this point, the only public riding area with black diamond level opportunities is the Iron Range Off Highway Vehicle Recreation Area in Gilbert. It is important for riders to know their abilities and know

## Reward offered in bear shooting case

The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and The HSUS Wildlife Land Trust are offering a \$2,500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or people responsible for illegally shooting a bear June 9 near Eagle's Nest Township, west of Ely. Also, the Turn In Poachers program in Minnesota is offering an additional \$300 for information leading to the arrest of the responsible party(s).

According to Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) conservation officers, a male black bear was shot near Trygg Road in Eagle's Nest

on June 9. A film crew had been following a radio collared black bear and the male bear when they heard a shot. The film crew continued to document the bear for five days after the incident and determined the male bear had been shot high in the hip area. The bear is expected to survive.

Under Minnesota law, shooting a bear out of season carries a maximum penalty of \$3,000 and a year in jail.

"Poaching is not only callous and irresponsible, it's also a crime that all too often goes unpunished," said Jill Fritz, Minnesota state director

## Shoreland buffers can be beautiful

Installing a shoreland buffer can provide habitat for critters and fish and help to protect the health of the lake, but isn't it just a bunch a weeds along the

shore? The answer to this question is: "not necessarily" – sometimes "weeds" can take over a shore, but usually native plants are

interesting and beautiful. That is why it is important to take the time to plan the design and prepare the site when installing a shoreland buffer.

In planning a shoreland buffer, consider how the shoreline will be used, then add some creativity. A colorful boarder of native wildflowers mixed in with grasses and flowering shrubs between the beach and lawn area is likely to attract butterflies, humming birds and people. While some plants may not have showy flowers, they

may have interesting seed heads or lush foliage.

A meandering path through a thicket of ferns and other shade loving plants can add interest and excitement to a landscape. Adding aquatic plants near shore may draw in birds to feed on the seed heads and fish hiding from predators, resting in the shade or feeding. There are many beautiful plants that work in upland, wet areas along the shore and in the water. Diversity in the kinds of plants will help to attract a broader variety of wildlife and create a more interesting landscape.

Any gardener knows that good site preparation results in a garden that is easier to care for. Sometimes invasive plant species can "take over" a site. Removing these plants may take some diligence, but the results are well worth it. Once established, a healthy shoreland buffer with a diversity of plants may be less susceptible to weed invasions. But, like any garden it takes some attention.

There are workshops, books, CDs and websites that can help in designing and maintaining the shoreland buffer that suits both the site and your needs. Both the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources and University of Minnesota Extension Service have staff and resources that can provide assistance.
