# Andy Gibson steamer resurfaces as subject of study -School children and scholars will learn about Aitkin's riverboat past

The lore of the Mississippi Man has been studying

the great river that bisects Minnesota since the most ancient settlements of the Native Americans and the white man. In the steamboat era of the late 1800s and early 1900s, all matter of commerce and goods for farmers and businessman traversed the river, as did passengers on business and on midnight moonlight excursions for dancing and sight-seeing.

Their mode of travel was steamships, wooden beauties that could hold 150 people and a ton of cargo, as did the Andy Gibson, a famous workhorse of a steamship that set the first speed record for a round trip from Aitkin to Grand Rapids and back.

Ann Merriman and Christopher Olson of Maritime Heritage Minnesota were

awarded a \$6,968 grant to excavate the steamer Andy Gibson and nominate it to the National Register of Historic

The grant is a Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage award with matching in-kind donations of \$5,340 to be provided by Maritime Heritage Minnesota and its supporters.

MHM was organized in 2005 to preserve, conserve, and when necessary, excavate Minnesota's finite maritime archaeological and historical resources. The two plan to study 225

river miles in Aitkin, Itasca and Cass counties and to document underwater wrecks. The steamer Andy Gibson, which sank at Potter's Landing by Aitkin's sewer plant, and the Swan, sunk upriver a ways, will be the priorities

for study. They believe there are even more undiscovered steamer and ferry wrecks along that stretch of river.

Their study will be published for various maritime and river lore scholars to use and will be available to the public and school children. All about the Andy Gibson

Perusing the Aitkin Historical Society's files reveals that the Andy Gibson was a working boat that plied the

Mississippi River between

Aitkin and Grand Rapids from

1886 to 1889. Built at 130 feet, it was expanded to 140 feet and could carry 100 tons of freight and

150 passengers.

It set a record, racing to Grand Rapids and back to Aitkin in 37 hours in what was previously a 51-hour run. The smaller, lighter Fawn steamer surpassed it two weeks later,

making the trip in 36 hours. The Gibson hosted passengers for midnight cruises

up and down the river and to Rice River and other landings. In 1891, the Potter Com-

pany bought the ship for logging. In 1892, the boilers and heating system were removed and went into the Potter Store in Aitkin.

Years later, in 1906, the rest of the interior equipment was sold to a logging operation in Bena, and was used for log hauling on Lake Winnebigoshish.

# Rusty Blackbird dependent on wooded wetlands

The Rusty Blackbird gets its "rusty" name from the brownish rust edges of their new feathers in the fall, a color that they loose over the winter. Specimens of the Rusty Blackbird were described in the early 1800's under five different names by British naturalist Alexander Wilson because of troubles that they had with using dried skins in different plumages and sizes. When they finally determined that it was a single species, they gave it the scientific name "euphagus carolinus" which means "eating well in Carolina", for a specimen taken in South Carolina.

The Rusty Blackbird is between eight and nine and one-half inches long. The male in spring plumage is entirely black with a dull greenish gloss on its head. It has thin black legs and eyes that are yellow, almost white. He kind of suggests a short tailed

Grackle. The female in spring plumage is slate gray colored, similar to a female Brewer's Blackbird, but grayer. She has yellow eyes. Winter colored adults have a rusty wash on their new feathers and they are barred below. The female has a broad, buff colored eyebrow, buff colored under parts and a gray rump. The male is darker, his eyebrow stripe is much duller and his barring underneath is bolder. Their song is described as hoarse "kush-a-lee", sounding like a rusty hinge or a frog's call. An oddball among blackbirds, the rusty flies like a thrush.

In Minnesota, they only nest in a very small area of Cook and Lake Counties along the Canadian border. They return from their wintering grounds in the southeastern United States in March and April. Their fall migration is in September and October. Their courtship is simple and not very fancy. With his bill wide open and tail spread, he makes a series of squeaking notes sounding like an un-oiled windmill. They are fairly shy, breeding in inaccessible places, often in wet swampy woods with alders. Unlike many blackbirds, they nest singly, usually in shrubs over water. The nest is a bulky combination of twigs and grasses, lined with finer grasses. The female lays four or five bluish green eggs with brown splotches which she alone incubates for about 14 days. While she incubates, the male feeds her frequently at the nest. The young are able to fly in about 14 days. They are primarily ground feeders, searching wet shores along woodland ponds, sometimes wading into the water. About 50 percent of their diet is animal matter - beetles, grasshoppers, caterpillars, flies, snails and small fish. The other 50 percent is weed

seeds, grass seeds, waste grains and some berries.

Rusty Blackbirds are among the last blackbirds to head south. Preparing to fly, groups may face into the wind singing a "concert" of gurgles and squeaks. Spring and fall migrations may consist of enormous flocks of mixed groups of Red-winged Blackbirds, Brewer's Blackbirds, Yellowheaded Blackbirds, Grackles and Rusty Blackbirds. These flocks can be very noisy, undulating, rippling masses rolling through the sky. Pioneers used to call the Rusty Blackbird a "rusty crow" or a "rusty grackle."

Thomas Sadler Roberts wrote in 1932 that the "group sounds like an immense number of tinkling sleigh-bells with an undertone like the creaking of wheels on frozen snow. It is a pleasing and not unmusical performance and the birds seem always to be having the very best time

# DNR — Question of the Week


**Q:** It can be difficult to distinguish private land from public land. What should hunters remember as they are out hunting this fall?

**A:** It is your responsibility as a hunter to know whether or not you are hunting on private or public lands. Hunters who are interested in hunting on private land or need to access private property to retrieve downed game should "Always Ask First." Many

landowners are very accommodating and enjoy opening up their land to hunters.


Trespassing is the most frequent complaint landowners have against hunters. Technically, any entry onto private property without landowner permission is considered trespass. Failure to ask before hunting on private property can cut off access to these lands in the future and significantly impact hunting opportunities throughout Minnesota.

Many landowners also conduct habitat management programs on their property. Asking first will ensure that hunters do not interfere with those private land management activities. Additional trespass information can be found in the 2010 Minnesota Hunting and Trapping Regulations Handbook starting on page six.



# **Update on plasma gasification plant**

A meeting was recently held and comments are being shared publicly about a proposed plasma arc gasification plant to be built in the Palisade area.

A group called PAGE is for the plant: studying options and getting financing to site a plant. An anti-plant group called Protect Aitkin County Concerned Citizens is trying to slow the process down and get environmental questions answered.

The pro-plant group held a public meeting on Oct. 26 where they talked a lot about the technical process for the plant. A superhot torch will convert household garbage

and tires to ethanol, paving and wooly materials, algae and pet food. Engineers are refining the process and a feasibility study grant is sought from IRRR.

Meanwhile, concerned citizens continue to publish letters to the editor with environmental concerns about a garbage plant harming their quality of life.

Church Carlson II, recently elected Palisade's mayor, said the council voted to no longer be the fiscal agent for grants for Palisade PAGE — the proplant group. Thus far, PAGE has obtained grants from the Blandin Foundation.

The city is holding off on

voting whether to annex land in Logan Township for a future plasma plant. In an effort to find out how everyone feels, township and city residents, about siting a plant here, Carlson said a mail survey ought to collect the opinions of all area residents and then decision-makers can move forward based on the wants of the people.

Carlson said about 300 local people signed a petition opposed to the plant. Those circulating the petition say they have 700 total signatures in opposition to siting a plasma arc gasification plant in Palisade.

# Many deer hunters had good opener

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reported today that firearm hunters harvested and registered 85,163 deer this past Saturday and Sunday, up very slightly from last year's 85,074.

The early harvest numbers suggest the overall harvest will be somewhat higher than last year, when hunters took about 195,000 deer. Deer hunter numbers are also up this year.

"Statewide, we're off to a good start," said Lou Cornicelli, DNR big game coordinator. "But as always, we will see significant regional variability in deer population."

Cornicelli said the new online and toll-free phone deer registration options make it difficult to make precise comparisons between this year's harvest and last year's harvest. Unlike previous years, when hunters took their deer to registration stations, 54 percent of this year's successful hunters simply registered their deer by computer or phone

Also, as of Monday, the DNR had issued 431,268 firearms licenses, up from 423,883 last year. Youth licenses accounted for a portion of the increase,

including an increase in licenses for 10- and 11-yearold deer hunters.

Hunters in southeastern Minnesota, where a new antler point restriction regulation went into effect this year, harvested fewer bucks and more antlerless deer. Buck harvest was down 28 percent and antlerless harvest was up 23 percent.

The regular firearms season will continue through Nov. 14 for most of the state. It will continue through Nov. 21 in northeastern Minnesota. The late southeast firearms season is Nov. 20-28.





# **Be a Signing Star contest winners**

The contest idea appeared in a grant submitted to the Minnesota DNR by the Fifty Lakes Property Owners Association. The contest was intended to solicit slogans that would alert citizens to the spread of invasive aquatic species among regional lakes. "By some miracle we won a matching grant," said Mark Johnson, of the Fifty Lakes Property Owners Association "and to come up with the slogans, we thought it would be fun to have a radio contest."

The slogans had to conform to the style of the Burma Shave ads familiar to most Americans over 60. Burma Vita was a Minneapolis shaving cream company on the verge of bankruptcy in the 1920s, when its founder decided to post rhyming slogans on a series of small signs spaced for reading by passing highway motorists. One series read like this: Past/School Houses/Take it Slow/Let the Little Shavers Grow/ Burma Shave.

"The signs became one of the most successful ad campaigns in US history," said Johnson, creator of the contest. "I thought, let's use the idea of posting small signs along the highway but have slogans with the theme of stopping aquatic hitchhikers."

According to Johnson, the contest was a success. More than 420 slogans were submitted. The three winners of the Be A Signing Star contest are Bob Scharenbroich, Pequot Lakes; Carol Jansen, McGregor; and David Bear, Lawton, OK. "Each was awarded a prize of \$100 and the honor of being an unofficial poet laureate of Fifty Lakes, Minnesota," said Johnson.

The Fifty Lakes Property Owners Association is an organization of over 200 property owners whose primary mission is to preserve and protect the lakes in the Fifty Lakes area.

The first of the winning slogans will appear on road signs along Highway 1 in Fifty Lakes in November.

# Federal Reserve puts families, nation at risk; Soros calls for world currency

The day after the elections, Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke authorized the printing of \$600 billion to buy back U.S. debt, in order jump-start the economy.

The move – dubbed QE2, short for quantitative easing was widely criticized by both domestic and international markets as being far too risky and untested. This was first round of quantitative easing began in December 2008.

However, President Obama publicly defended Bernanke's move while in India.

One corporate finance and strategic consultant wrote about the QE2:

"One of the most important questions of the day concerns how the dollar will fare in the coming months and years.

"If you are working for a wage, it is essential to know whether you should save or spend that money. If you have assets to protect, where you place those monies is vitally important and could make the difference between a relatively pleasant future and a difficult

"If you have any interest at all in where interest rates are headed, you'll want to understand this (issue)."

# **RISKY BUSINESS**

Zubi Diamond, author of "The Wizards of Wall Street," warned that the Fed's move is already putting Americans in serious jeopardy - as seen by

the marked price increase in goods

and services. "The QE2 will increase the debt, devalue our currency and create a bigger problem that won't solve the crisis," Diamond said. "Eventually, America could collapse under its own weight of massive debt."

J.D. Foster, Ph.D., the Norman B. Ture Senior Fellow in the Economics of Fiscal Policy for The Heritage Foundation, agreed:

"Quantitative easing is a largely experimental tool employed by the Federal Reserve to address a continuing sluggish economy and the renewed potential of deflation.

"That the Fed faces this prospect is final proof positive that President Barack Obama's Keynesian stimulus policies have failed, leaving monetary policy as the sole remaining major stimulus tool. The risks associated with quantitative easing are substantial, including that it will fail, or will trigger a resurgence of inflation with or without a pickup in output

### growth. THE SOROS FACTOR

The status of the U.S. dollar, which has been the world's reserve currency, is also at risk.

Conservatives are deeply concerned that the Fed's move also opens up the U.S. currency to a move by George Soros, the liberal hedge fund financier, who has made his wealth by betting against currencies

Soros, who has been calling for an international currency, told the Financial Times that China should lead the economic currency - and that America should, not resist the weakening dollar, lower living standards and introduction to a new currency.

In an op-ed published last year, Soros wrote:

"Reorganizing the world order will need to extend beyond the financial system and involve the United Nations, especially membership of the Security Council. That process needs to be initiated by the U.S., but China and other developing countries ought to participate as equals... The system cannot survive in its present form, and the U.S. has more to lose by not being in the forefront of reform-

### ing it." **GOING FORWARD**

Heritage's Foster said that the new Congress will not have easy choices to make:

"Even if successful, the Fed will need to act decisively down the road, reversing course by pushing up short-term and longterm interest rates to prevent a bout of new asset price bubbles and inflation. These future actions could produce another recession in the face of still-high unemployment.

"Navigating these waters successfully will require extraordinary skill and luck.

"The President and Congress could greatly improve the Fed's prospects for success by vowing not to raise taxes and instead reducing federal budget deficits by substantially reducing spend-








Rudder parts of the Andy Gibson. Sadly, the old steamship wreck has been extensively looted over the 100-plus years it has rested in the Mississippi.

The hull of the Andy Gibson was sunk at Potter's Landing, still lying along the Mississippi in the town of Aitkin near the sewer plant. The hull filled with river sludge and Mississippi Mud. However, in the early days after it's sinking, Euclid Chatelle and other boys used it as a diving platform, And, over the years, when droughts came, the bones of the Gibson were exposed, leading to photographs and articles in the local press. Dry years when the Gibson was exposed for press coverage included 1967, 1984 and 2006.

### Early newspaper account Here is the early newspa-

per account of the Gibson being and dismantled:

"Remains of steamer Andy Gibson are sold

The old river steamer Andy Gibson, long since out of commission, was a giant in her day and while well remembered by the old residents of Aitkin and Grand Rapids was supposed to have been heard of for the last time as far as future usefulness is concerned. This, however, is not entirely correct as the remaining castings and machinery have been bought and shipped to Bena where a large new steamer will be built to ply the waters of Lake Winnibigoshish. G. E. Godfrey of Ball Club has been here during the past week loading the car with machinery which was bought from the Potter-Casey Co."

### **Riverboat History**

In the heyday of the steamship, there were 25 river stops between Aitkin and Grand Rapids. However, farmers and others living along the Mississippi's banks could hang a flag or set off a flare. The steamship would stop and pick up produce or livestock for market or take orders to deliver merchandise the following week.

Steamship captains were able to conduct marriages and funerals and were prominent community leaders along the river's route. The steamships were essential to commerce of the time, hauling people, lumber, horses, pigs, fresh milk, catalog orders and all products imaginable.

# Firsthand account

Serena Goward was an excitable young lady at the

time the Andy Gibson was launched on the Mississippi. Her brother, Hemen Haugen, was one of the engineers and so Serena was given unparalleled access to the boat and often got to travel with her friends at the company's expense.

On the first voyage she remembers, Fred Bonners was the captain, "my brother, Hemen Haugen, was one of the engineers. John Lyons was the pilot, Johnny Paine the cook and Jim Gibson was bookkeeper clerk... There were some men who helped load and unload. Some of these were white, but Mr. Lowell [E.B. Lowell, one of three owners] liked to obtain Indians for help. He spoke Chippewa quite a little and he liked to help the Indians."

John Lyons, the pilot, was an Indian and a top-notch river man who "knew every trick and turn in the river. He had the blood of a true pilot. In the upper river his two daughters each married a Tibbetts boy."

Serena formed a friendship with the cook Johnny Paine, who fed her beans baked in the ground and lemon pie.

The ship's journal shows they took in \$629 for the first trip.

Serena describes the cargo when she and a friend boarded the Andy Gibson: "We crossed the gang plank into the lower part of the boat, past workmen loading and by piles of boxes and bundles of freight, horse, cows, pigs and everything imaginable."

She told of one midnight excursion to Selly's Ranch. Her brother had the evening off and came on board as a passenger bringing along a lady friend. The substitute engineer let the boiler burn up, the ship ran aground and Hemen Haugen had to "change into his overalls and go to work."

Much too soon, the Gibson was retired and sunk, as the railroad, horses and automobiles provided the transportation needed for commerce and socializing.

"There were the good old days on the river," Serena said in an interview, "but still it seems to me that the river washes more lightly as it ripples over the spot where sleeps the rolling hull of the steamer Andy Gibson."

# **News from Maritime Heritage Minnesota**

Ann Merriman and Christopher Olson from the Maritime Heritage of Minnesota had this to say about their Andy Gibson project: The Andy Gibson Dry Nautical Excavation and NRHP Nomination project was made possible in part by the Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Grant program, aka - The Legacy Amendment.

The scope of work included the Mississippi River Aitkin County Survey - a side and down imaging sonar survey of the 104 miles of the river in Aitkin County. This was conducted in August 2010 and we are still analyzing the results. We will be claiming four new maritime archaeological sites for Aitkin County beyond the two already known sites of the Andy Gibson and Swan wrecks in Aitkin. Three of the new sites are landings and the fourth is a steamboat crib on the Sandy River at the confluence with the Mississippi. We identified 250 anomalies during the survey using the sonar, and after analysis, we've determined that we need to dive on 41 of them to determine if they are archaeological sites. This does not necessarily mean steamboat wrecks, but also possible flatboats, wanagans, dock structures, small personal craft, rowboats, steam launches, etc. We hope to write one or two grants to dive on the sites next summer. The survey project was also made possible in part by the Minnesota Historical and Cultural Heritage Grant program, aka - The Legacy Amendment.

Maritime Heritage Minnesota had three primary goals for the Andy Gibson project this year: 1 To determine if her starboard side gunwale was till intact in the riverbank and document it. We found the gunwale and other associated boat parts - deck planking, deck beams, futtocks, clamp, rub rail - intact. Andy Gibson's gunwale is the only intact one of any Mississippi River wreck that we know of; 2. Complete a plan view site plan of the wreck site as far as we can that includes MHM's 2008, 2009, and 2010 work on the site; and 3. Nominate the wreck to the National Register of Historic Places.

We met our first goal - the gunwale is in great shape under the river bank - we opened three trenches and dug down to the wreck, finding the gunwale rather quickly. We drew the exposed boat parts, took dozens of photographs, and back- The Andy Gibson is full up with passengers for a summer filled the trenches. We left written evidence on non-biodegradable blaze orange ribbon that MHM was there - and left the excursion. wreck exactly as we found her. We're still working on the second and third goals.

During the excavation, we also conducted some survey using our dumpy level and stadia rod so that we can fix the wrecks site properly on maps. We also used a very precise GPS unit to get the exact latitude/longitude of the wreck, her gunwale, and the bench mark that we created on site for our future use.

A major part of MHM's mission is to educate the public about shipwrecks. Shipwrecks in Minnesota are owned by the State of Minnesota, and are protected by state and federal laws as archaeological sites. Andy Gibson, and all underwater sites that are 50 years old or older, all under the Abandoned Shipwreck Act of 1987, a federal law prohibiting the looting of wreck sites, or souvenir collecting. The archaeologists for MHM are trained nautical and terrestrial archaeologists and are licensed by the State of Minnesota, and our goals are to document, conserve, and preserve sites, not damage or destroy them. Archaeology is not treasure-hunting or salvaging, both of which are illegal. # **Breakfast done light and easy**

For brunch or breakfast fans, granola and yogurt have become a morning favorite. Healthy and providing enough of a punch to help you get out and go on a fall morning, a parfait such as the following "Granola Parfait" from The Culinary Institute of America's "Breakfasts & Brunches" (Lebhar-Friedman Books) is sure to put a smile on the faces breakfast's biggest fans.

# **Granola Parfait** Makes 8 Servings

- 1 1/4 cups blueberries
- 1 1/4 cups raspberries 1 1/4 cups quartered or sliced strawberries
- 4 cups plain yogurt 4 cups granola (recipe follows)
- 1. Combine the berries in a bowl and toss together.
- 2. Add a layer of the berries to each parfait glass, then a layer of yogurt, followed by a layer of granola. Add a second layer of berries, followed by additional layers of granola and yogurt. Top the parfait with berries.
- 3. Serve at once or keep refrigerated for up to 4 hours.

### **Granola** Makes 8 Servings

- 1 1/2 cups rolled oats
- 1/4 cup canola oil
- 1/2 cup turbinado or light brown sugar
- 2 teaspoons ground cinammon 1/2 cup sunflower seeds
- 1/2 cup packed sweetened shredded coconut
- 1/4 cup wheat germ 1/4 cup sesame seeds 1/4 cup chopped almonds
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts 1/2 cup raisins
- 1. Preheat the oven to 300 F.



2. Combine the oil, oats, sugar, and cinammon. Spread the oat mixture in an even layer on a baking sheet and bake, stirring occasionally, until it is fragrant and lightly toasted, about 20 minutes.

3. Add the sunflower seeds, coconut, wheat germ, sesame seeds, almonds, and walnuts to the mixture in the pan. Stir together and spread into an even layer on the pan and bake until golden brown, about 15 minutes. Add the raisins and cool completely.

4. Store in an airtight container in a cool, dry place.
